Item 1-3 Meeting called to order, Pledge of Allegiance, Meeting quorum met.

Item 4: General Community Event Announcements:

Karen von Gunten -- Little Landers Historical Society -There will be a Spooky Stories, Tales & Poems event at Bolton Hall on October 26th, 6pm to 9pm. Thank you to STNC for your support. Local residents and Village Poets will share spooky stories and poems of events in Foothills history. There will be games, pumpkin carving and a costume contest. This will be a fun, not dark event.

Nancy Shannon – The Love the Neighborhood Initiative will be having a tree giveaway event this Saturday from 8am to 12 pm. Those interested should meet at the Hub church, which is in the same shopping center as Pena's Tacos (8263 Foothill Blvd, Sunland).

Roger Klemm – 1) There are 3 events going on at the Welcome Garden (Sunland Blvd across from 210 freeway). There is going to be a fire wise garden tour sponsored by Theodore Payne Foundation on Oct. 12, 10:30am to 3pm; a trimming event on October 19, 9am to 11am; and a planting event on November 9, 2019. 2) The Sunland Tujunga / Shadow Hills Rotary Club is having a special Polio meeting at Bolton Hall on Oct. 22nd from 7pm to 9pm.

Bren Boo – the Sunland Foursquare Church is having a Treat Yo Self event on Oct. 31st, which begins at 6pm. There will be games, prizes, lots of treats.

Pattee Colvin, Making It Happen—they are beginning to plan for this year's Christmas event, there is a sign-up sheet if anyone wants to sponsor a child from our local area.

Sheri Smith -- Little Landers Historical Society / Bolton Hall – The Second Saturday event on Oct. 12th at 1pm will be the story of Union Station, history and architecture.

Michelle Ramage-- The Sunland Tujunga / Shadow Hills Rotary Club/ STNC Arts and Culture Committee – There is going to be a Free Animation Event, ADD Man at the Sunland Tujunga library, 3:30 pm.

Judy Kamela, Friends of the Sunland Tujunga Library Bookstore – reminder that there is a bookstore at the Sunland Tujunga Library with a wide selection of books and other items. All proceeds go to fund library events like puppet shows and reading clubs. They are also looking for more volunteers.

Sue Ellen – Mission Opera Co. this group is affiliated with LA Mission College who wants to bring more culture events to the Sunland Area, they are looking for available space in area.

Sonia Tatulian – October 19th is the 4th Armenian Arts and Culture Festival, on Commerce Ave. beginning at Foothill, 12noon to 9pm.

Roger Klemm—very sorry to report the passing of active community member Wendell Bowers.

Item 6: Representative Announcements and Reports:

Assembly Member Luz Rivas – Represents the 39th Assembly District which covers Sylmar to North Hollywood, including Sunland Tujunga. The Governor has until this Sunday to sign bills into law. She proposed 8 bills this session, 3 have been signed so far. The state legislative session runs from January through September. Her major focus has been on 3 key issues: homelessness, education and health. As far as homelessness, her main focus has been homeless children and families, a major issue in the area. 24% of the children living in Pacoima do not have stable housing. She obtained 1 million dollars in state department of education funding to address this problem. The state has added 6 positions to the Homeless Coordinating Advisory Council. The legislature passed a onetime budget item of \$500 million to provide homeless infrastructure. On the education front her bill prohibiting educational institutions from withholding student transcripts for non-payment of outstanding debts has been signed by the governor. The state passed a resolution recognizing the Armenian Genocide. The state is also going to be divesting state funds from Turkey. There is going to be 2 free year's tuition for new full time students. There is going to be gender equity for prize money if any event is held on state property. The legislature passed a 200 billion dollar state budget. 80 billion of that is for education but this is not enough, we still lag behind most of the nation in per pupil spending. She is often asked what about all the lottery money but this is only 1 billion, not enough to help that much. AB 516, the no towing for expired plates, tickets, 72 hour violation etc. did not pass; it was stopped by Senator Portantino. Sun Valley and 5

Questions and Answers:

President Sanchez – Thank you for being so easy to work with, your staff has been wonderful. Assembly Member Rivas—I have 3 field reps who attend the meetings of all 11 neighborhood councils in the 39th district. They are her eyes and ears. Each area has its own issues while some issues come up everywhere she goes. This information gives her a feel on how to vote on issues.

Stakeholder Mark Seigel – concerned that Ron Galperin reported that the HHH housing was costing an average of \$475,000 a unit. Can there be a team to find lower cost alternatives? Assembly Member Rivas – The Governor has a homeless advisory board with some city mayors involved. She is a member of the LA County Caucus, they are meeting in two weeks to see what they can do. She thinks this is the first time that all levels of government are getting together to co-ordinate their efforts.

V.P. Royal – Regarding the Governor's decision to repurpose SB 1 highway funds (for places that do not meet housing goals), did this go through the state legislature? Assembly Member Rivas – no.

Board Member Khanjian – Regarding SB 276 (the vaccine bill) – is afraid this law will lower school enrollment and encourage home schooling. Assembly Member Rivas – this bill goes according to % of immunity, most schools in this district are at 90% immunity.

Captain David Grimes LAPD – he is coming to this meeting because both our SLO's are taking training. There are 4 NC's in the Foothill Division. There has been a 20% reduction in violent crime in Sunland and an 18% reduction in Tujunga. Crime in the Foothill Division is down 8.6%. Foothill is the City's 3rd largest division. It has the lowest overall reported crime rate. Service is based on crimes reported, if you see something, say something. There are many volunteer opportunities to help understaffed law enforcement. They would like 5,000 volunteers in the San Fernando Valley alone.

Raquel Beltran, DONE General Manager—she is 4 weeks into the job, in process of having a listening tour of all 99 neighborhood councils. The DONE mission is to promote civic engagement and make government more responsive to local needs. Outlines her extensive experience with city councils, public administration and community work. In her new position she has 4 goals: 1) Strengthen DONE as a resource to help with the NC's work; 2) Strengthen relationship between DONE and the NCs; 3) improve NC advocacy skills; 4)improve City Hall's relationship with NCs. The Board members will receive a listening tour survey.

Questions and Answers:

VP Sanchez – being a NC officer involves so many hours of unpaid work, yet many feel the NC has no power. Representatives do not come to the meetings. DONE GM Beltran – the NC is a structured system with an official line to the City Council so they can evaluate the pros / cons and bring voices to the process. You have to hear other views and keep in mind there will be other issues where you might be in agreement. You need to be respectful and nice when City officials come to meetings. V.P. Royal notes that our representative should be aware of Section 900 of the City Charter and early notification of NC's. They should abide by the rules just as NC members must. Numerous questions about whether this or that situation constitutes a conflict of interest, DONE GM Beltran notes it is difficult to say the answer without knowing all the specifics. As to DONE complaints, Semee Park can look at open grievances, they are not going to re-review processed grievances.

Dominique Vitti, Council Aide to Monica Rodriguez – Tomorrow is a red flag day. The LAPD and Sanitation Dept. are currently conducting sweeps to get illegal campers out of Hansen Dam. Oct. 2nd was national walk to school day and Monica Rodriguez went to visit Sunland School, they have prepared 1,000 educational banners to encourage safety when walking to school. The next local school they plan to visit is Pinewood Elementary at the end of October. LADOT restriped the parking area on Apperson between Mountair and Tujunga Canyon Blvd. by the church to prevent tractor trailer street parking. The Councilwoman has obtained 1.5 million in the 2020 budget for increased traffic enforcement on Vision Zero high injury network streets which include Foothill Blvd. The Councilwoman has opened a council file for the LAPD to report back on overtime costs and the results of other efforts to reduce injuries. Questions and Answers:

President Sanchez – Thanks Dominique for always being courteous and responsive. 1) Still waiting for a response to the STNC's letter sent to Monica Rodriguez regarding request for an additional traffic enforcement officer for Sunland Tujunga. 2) Why was there only one week delay between the Public Works hearing and for the City Council Hearing regarding the Saroyan Square sign? There were 250 public comments submitted. The STNC had a special board meeting on the issue and no one from the Council Office Came. 12 people came to speak at the City Council Hearing and they were not allowed to speak on the council file because the matter already had a public hearing before the Public Works Committee. VP Royal and Secretary Cleghorn agree that the lack of advance notice before the 1st public hearing and being pushed into the public comments section before they could speak was unacceptable.

Response from Doug Tripp, Monica Rodriguez Chief of Staff – the STNC seems very informed and availed themselves of the City processes. He read all the council file comments and found the history of our area very interesting. Anyone who contacted the council office was given the link to the public comments section on this council file.

Principal John Graham, Sunland School – He is the new principal and came to the meeting to introduce himself. He is very excited about his new positon and working with parents and the community.

Secretary Cleghorn inquired if the STNC was going to be the sole sponsor of this event. Nichole Royer, Sunland Park Director, responded that the Council office and the Sunland Tujunga / Shadow Hills Rotary Club are also interested. Any non-profit organization is welcome to participate. This event will be held on the side of the park building extending to the ball field where the artificial snow will be spread. It would be the STNC's choice if they want to sponsor or co-sponsor the event. Director Royer suggested that perhaps the STNC could set up a booth by the field and hand out the sleds. There will be hot chocolate, face painting and game booths supplied by LA Parks. There might be a moon jumper if they get funding. Treasurer Sandy Capps notes the STNC would pay the snow maker directly, the lowest cost vendor will be selected.

Recommendation from the Land Use Committee read: STNC opposes placement of a permanent ceremonial sign at the intersection of Commerce Avenue and Valmont Street because this intersection is the cornerstone of the history of Sunland-Tujunga and no signage marker should be placed here.

President Sanchez stated that she invited Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez or her representative to our Special Meeting tonight but did not hear from anyone with yes or no. She then asked if anyone present from Councilwoman Rodriguez office / staff. No one acknowledged. The council file is to be voted on by the city council tomorrow, Oct. 8th so this is a time sensitive item. Over 200 public comments are posted in the council file.

Public Comments on the motion from the following:

Elektra Kruger - rather than never having anything there, should be a person historic to this area.

Stakeholder - Why did Councilwoman Rodriguez do this ? Was it brought by a group in the community? We are perplexed at this.

Stakeholder who use to live in San Diego but now lives here - This is divisive and sneaky. Naming a square is something the entire community should be a part of.

Boardmember Comments:

Glen Belt - Adores our Councilwoman and stated only she should be making this decision. He will vote for this motion. We have a large Armenian population and they deserve recognition.

Nina - The charter guarantees Neighborhood Council's a voice. We should not be bypassed in the decision making process. This is what we clearly need to express at the vote tomorrow. They need to respect the Neighborhood Councils that are supposed to have a voice. They should outreach and get feedback from the broad community. Nina is opposed to the community being left out of the decision making process.

Lydia Grant - This was to be passed by City Council last week. We would not have known about it if it wasn't for a stakeholder. Lydia went with Carol Hutchinson to the City Council Public Works and Gang Reduction Committee meeting to ask for an extension of time. We got a one-week postponement. It is good that people have submitted their own comments to the Council file after our president made this public. If we had not gone to the committee meeting it would already be voted on. We went to the meeting so we could give our stakeholders a voice.

Jon von Gunten - good that it was postponed. We should be clear that whatever motion goes forward, we support the Armenian community but not at this intersection. That's the only problem here.

Stakeholder - Resident since 1952. This is a special interest group going for a land grab, piece of property. It doesn't constitute a reason to have a sign. It's back handed and sneaky. Things don't go through the City this quickly. He would like to see this kind of stuff stop. It all starts with something simple and then it grows to renaming a school or a street or something else. Why wouldn't someone local be considered for something like this? The board is in the middle. Agrees with comment from the earlier Land Use Committee discussion that CSUN has plenty of inclusive programs just for this and placing it there would be more effective.

Cindy Cleghorn - wants to bring our community together. We all want to be respectful of each other and be part of the discussion, not left out on purpose. Doesn't understand why there has to be division in our community like this. Celebrate our historic community.

Liliana Sanchez - Welcomes diversity. We are having this meeting for our Sunland-Tujunga Community. A Multi cultural event is being planned for next year.

Glen Belt interrupts - there are 4 people who caused the divide in this town. Glen Belt left the meeting.

Arsen Karamians - we are supposed to be a polite society. 33 years ago I entered the United States. I was working with the US Army in Iran and I came to New Hampshire where I was welcomed like a King. I was a refugee. What we are talking about is our historic town. Getting this approved by someone else is a shame. Let's come together for our community. I chose this area 10 years ago. I love this community. Let's keep it the way it is, please.

Stakeholder comment: In the future any recognition signs in our community need to be properly vetted and approved through the STNC by the community.

During the roll call vote it was realized that Sandy Capps had left the meeting room, bringing the total vote count to 10 in favor of the CIS. But since the board lost quorum during the vote, no action was taken on this motion and the special meeting adjourned 8:20 p.m.

Dear Councilmember Monica Rodriguez,

Over the past two years since you have been in office, we've seen a spike in the rate of traffic fatalities on Foothill and Sunland Boulevards in Sunland-Tujunga. In most of these cases, they were the result of excessive speeding and disregard for traffic signage. These two problem areas have been the locations for 12 – 15 fatalities in the past 2 years! Most have occurred on a one mile section of Foothill Boulevard from Sunland Boulevard to Mt. Gleason, as well as Sunland Boulevard from the 210 freeway to Shadow Hills. Several were pedestrians or bicyclists killed by motorists who were inattentive, speeding, making illegal U-turns, driving in the bike lane, driving up on the sidewalk, or otherwise failing to regard traffic signage.

Despite LADOT infrastructure improvements such as: European crosswalks, bollards to redirect traffic, the creation of safe bike lanes, and educational signage, traffic fatalities have continued to increase dramatically.

Our research on the number of fatalities comes from a combination of Vision Zero, the California TIMS study, LAPD Traffic and LADOT. (Each have different ways of tracking and most are not up to date). We polled our stakeholders with an online survey in June – July 2017 and of the 225 respondents, 100% agreed that traffic safety in Sunland-Tujunga was their #1 concern. Additionally, 94% requested more police enforcement along with some sort of educational campaign.

In June 2019, STNC supported our STAT committees request to your office asking you set up a Special Traffic Enforcement Fund that would allow LAPD Valley Traffic to allocate additional hours for traffic enforcement in our problem areas. We are now asking for the amount of \$80,000, which is based on Traffic Officers' pay scale of \$95.00 to \$100/per hour. This amount would allow LAPD Valley Traffic Captain Andrew Neiman to allocate more resources to our community of Sunland-Tujunga and is our committee's estimate of the minimum amount we would need for this one year campaign.

Currently, we have only one part-time officer, LAPD's Joel Flores, who also has responsibilities in other areas of the Valley. As a result, our problems are getting worse and residents are constantly telling us that they are afraid to back out of their driveways, they fear for their children's and pet's safety, and in many cases have been struck by hit and run drivers who leave the scene after causing an accident.

In return for your help, our committee members would gratefully support you in your dedication to making our community safer by outreaching to the media to create positive articles on our traffic issue and how we are working together to resolve it.

Please let us know how we can work with you to make this positive improvement together.

Dear Ms. Kramer,

Thank you for reaching out to my office with your concerns about traffic safety and your request for funding. As you can imagine, there are many issues across Council District 7, from criminal activity to traffic safety to wildfire prevention, and my office is continually balancing similar requests for additional enforcement. We will continue to strongly advocate for police, fire, and other resources to address these issues across the district.

As part of the 2019-2020 Adopted Budget, the City of Los Angeles allocated an additional \$1.5 million for enhanced enforcement by the Police Department in high-priority collision locations identified by the Vision Zero initiative (Foothill Blvd through Sunland-Tujunga is part of this High Injury Network). I recently sponsored a motion (Council File 19-1172) directing the Police Department to report back on the status of its Vision Zero enforcement efforts and on the use of Sworn Overtime allocated for this purpose in the 2019-2020 Adopted Budget. I encourage you to subscribe to the Council File Motion for updates and for the STNC to submit a Community Impact Statement if they would like to.

In addition, I would like to share some of my work on traffic safety in Sunland-Tujunga. The traffic survey for Foothill Blvd had expired back in 2010, which means that LAPD had not been able to use radar/laser enforcement to issue speeding tickets along Foothill Blvd since then. In the fall of 2017, I worked with the LADOT to prioritize getting a new survey done on Foothill Blvd to allow speeding enforcement by our traffic officers, and this survey happened in January of 2018. Speeding enforcement began shortly thereafter and we have worked closely with the

Valley Traffic division to ensure that we have regular speeding and traffic enforcement in Sunland-Tujunga.

We have also worked closely with the LADOT to improve traffic safety through engineering improvements in Sunland-Tujunga, as engineering is critical to improve traffic safety along with enforcement and education:

- January 2019 restriped the signalized 4-way intersections all along Foothill Blvd with higher-visibility continental crosswalks
- January 2019 installed bollards at the curve near Foothill and Mt Gleason to prevent the illegal left-turn that drivers were continually making
- Early 2019 secured \$4 million in funding to address traffic issues at dangerous intersections throughout our district and these improvements are now in the design phase, including the following improvements in Sunland-Tujunga: a new traffic signal at Foothill/Marnice, left turn phasing signals at Foothill/Oro Vista and Foothill/Mt Gleason (approved in 2015 and never funded), an emergency hybrid beacon at Foothill/Machrea in front of our LAFD station, and a pedestrian hybrid beacon at Foothill/Wyngate.
- May-September 2019 added a stop sign at Grove/Oro Vista and implemented a restriping plan where Big Tujunga Canyon joins Oro Vista Avenue, to slow speeders coming out of the Angeles Forest before entering this residential Sunland neighborhood
- October 2019 implemented an entire restriping plan along Apperson between Mountair and Tujunga Canyon Blvd to address speeding and other unsafe behavior by drivers near the sensitive sites of the school and church located on that block

In addition, we are activating our local schools to work on traffic safety issues on and around their campuses. On October 2, we coordinated a Walk-to-School day at Sunland Elementary, and are in the process of coordinating another one with Pinewood Elementary. We are connecting these schools with the DOT's Safe Routes to School program, to provide free on-campus traffic safety education for students, parents, and staff. We also have provided over 100 large traffic safety banners at the beginning of this school year to elementary and middle schools throughout our district, and also have installed them on several main corridors, like Foothill, Wentworth, La Tuna Canyon. Public Safety is a top priority of mine, particularly in regards to traffic safety. Thank you for sharing your concerns in regards to this issue.







HOMELESSNESS AND POVERTY COMMITTEE REPORT relative to a request for an Ordinance to amend the Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) Section 41.18 to conform to the 9th Circuit decision in the Martin v. Boise case.

Recommendation for Council action, as initiated by Motion (O'Farrell - Martinez):

REQUEST the City Attorney to draft an Ordinance, repealing the current version of the LAMC Section 41.18 and replacing it with the language below:

(a) No person shall obstruct the public right of way in a manner that restricts ten feet of clearance from any operational and utilizable entrance, exit, driveway or loading dock.

(b) No person shall obstruct the public right of way in a manner that restricts passage as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

(c) No person shall obstruct the free passage of pedestrians in the public right-of-way by engaging in the following aggressive behavior:

(1) Approaching, following closely or speaking to a person in a manner that is intended to or is likely to cause a reasonable person to:

(i) Fear bodily harm to oneself or another, or damage to or loss of property.

(ii) Otherwise be intimidated into giving money or other thing of value.

(iii) Respond immediately with a violent reaction because of the inherent nature of the reasonably perceived harm.

(2) Intentionally touching or causing physical contact with another person without that person's consent.

(3) Intentionally blocking or interfering with the safe or free passage of a pedestrian, including unreasonably causing a pedestrian to take evasive action to avoid physical contact.

(d) No person shall sit, lie or sleep in or upon any street, sidewalk, or other public right-of-way as follows:

(1) At any time in a manner that restricts ten feet of clearance from any utilizable and operational entrance, exit, driveway or loading dock.

(2) At any time in a manner that restricts passage as required by the ADA.

(3) At any time:

* . *

(i) Within 500 feet of a park.

(iii) Within 500 feet of a daycare center.

(iv) In or upon any tunnel, bridge or pedestrian subway that is on a route designated by City Council resolution as a school route.

(v) Within 500 feet of a facility opened after January 1, 2018 to provide housing, shelter, supportive services, safe parking, or storage to homeless persons.

(vi) Bike and other recreational paths.

(vii) Public areas (non-sidewalk) posted with No Trespass signs for safety purposes.

(viii) Public areas posted with closing times for safety and maintenance purposes.

(ix) Crowded public sidewalk areas like those exempted in the Citywide vending ordinance and other large venue-adjacent areas.

<u>Fiscal Impact Statement</u>: Neither the City Administrative Officer nor the Chief Legislative Analyst has completed a financial analysis of this report.

The Echo Park Neighborhood Council hereby submits this Community Impact Statement in opposition unless amended to Council File 19-0602-S1.

The proposed rewriting of LAMC 41.18 as the City's response to the Martin v. Boise 9th Circuit Court decision, which already rendered the current writing of the existing ordinance unconstitutional, will continue the city's counter-productive approach the homelessness crisis. This bill would make it illegal to sit, sleep or lie within 500 feet of a school, park or daycare center, and 10 feet from any utilizable entrance, driveway or loading dock. Moreover, it contains broad, undefined language banning sitting, lying or sleeping at any time "In or upon any tunnel, bridge or pedestrian subway that is on a route designated by City Council resolution as a school route" as well as "...large venue-adjacent areas" which have never been defined by any City law and would be interpreted on subjective discretion.

While "Part A" regarding ADA accessibility of public paths is important for safety, security and hygiene, the overall motion is overly broad and punitive. We propose a rewrite that adds the necessary protections for the public safety without unnecessary broad restrictions effectively criminalizing homeless in most areas of the City of Los Angeles.

Instead of funding much needed services like additional hygiene facilities or addiction treatment, if this amended ordinance were to pass, resources would again be diverted to criminalize the unhoused and punish them for their poverty. Given the structural forces that lead most unhoused Angelenos to reside on the streets, this approach is needlessly cruel. Additionally, this measure makes it criminal to approach another person based on the mere perception of danger, echoing notorious "Stand Your Ground" laws.

Furthermore, this policy as written would be nearly impossible to enforce and would bring about a host of unwanted side effects. For example, children waiting for their parents to pick them up after school would be turned into criminals if they were to sit down on the sidewalk. Measurements related to doorways will be litigated ad nauseam at enormous expense to the taxpayers of Los Angeles. This ordinance, much like its predecessor, would struggle to withstand a legal challenge. As such, we oppose the adoption of this ordinance as written, and strongly urge the city to reconsider its approach to the issue of homelessness and utilize proven best practices from other cities.

Board Resolution

On September 24, 2019, with a quorum of 21, the EPNC Board of Governors held a Brown Act-noticed meeting and with a vote of 21 yeas, 0 nays, and 0 abstentions, the EPNC voted to submit this CIS.

Please note that this site is in Target Area 3, Major Activity Area 3 of the Foothill Blvd. Corridor Specific Plan.

The Sunland Tujunga Neighborhood Council (STNC) received a copy of the Letter of Determination dated September 12, 2019 for 9945 Commerce Avenue approving a Day Care facility there. The STNC has serious concerns about the traffic situation which will be created by this day care facility in this location.

When representatives for the day care made a presentation to the STNC Land Use Committee (LUC) on August 5, 2019, the day care owner stated that they intend to use the area behind the building, adjacent to the alley, for employee parking. Parents will be instructed to use the parking spaces on Commerce Avenue for dropping off and picking up their children.

The day care plans to have up to forty children, ages 2 to 4 years, daily. The hours will be 7 am to 6 pm, Monday thru Saturday. Parking on Commerce is public parking that is shared with other businesses so parents are not guaranteed a parking spot, and parking will be needed because it takes time to remove children this age from the car seats and walk them inside.

Commerce Avenue is a very heavily used street during the hours these children will be dropped off and picked up. Parents unlucky enough not to get a parking space immediately will be stopping traffic to wait for an available spot. Drivers leaving will be backing up into traffic because the parking is diagonal on this side of Commerce Avenue and there is only one lane of traffic in each direction. Other drivers will be crossing the double yellow line to get past the stopped cars. Traffic jams and increased accidents will be inevitable if this happens.

The STNC urges you to reconsider allowing the day care to operate at this location or at minimum update the conditions of approval to accommodate child drop off and pick up at a different location other than the street frontage.

The STNC is **<u>opposed</u>** to the project for the following reasons:

- There should be at least two parking spaces per unit; at least one space for each bedroom. Onstreet parking at this location and surrounding this location is already severely inadequate. This project will only cause an additional demand that can't be met.
- We also oppose the increase of height to 40 ft. The Foothill Blvd. Corridor Specific Plan (FBCSP) should be enforced. The project should be redesigned to eliminate the requested height increase.

In addition, the STNC's Land Use Committee has not had a chance to review and comment on the most current Design and Landscaping plan. In the December meeting the LUC expressed concerns over the color choices and landscaping. We would like the applicant to return to the LUC on this matter.

The STNC would like to go on record that this Density Bonus ordinance is in direct opposition to the intentions of the FBCSP to limit the height of buildings and preserve the mountain views in the Sunland-Tujunga area. Please respect and enforce the FBCSP ordinance.

On December 17, 2018, the owner and engineer for this project presented the plans to the Sunland-Tujunga Neighborhood Council (STNC) Land Use Committee and neighboring stakeholders.

The STNC is **<u>opposed</u>** to the project for the following reasons:

- Plans call for 16 parking spaces. This is inadequate. Two parking spaces per unit should be required for this location. This project will cause an additional demand for on-street parking which is inadequate now. The STNC receives complaints from neighbors on this block of Hillhaven Avenue due to inadequate parking now.
- Geographically, Tujunga is built on a hillside too steep for most people to bicycle on. Bicycle parking should be replaced with auto parking. Requiring bicycle space in place of automobile parking space is literally to discriminate against anyone who is not physically capable of bicycling up Foothill Boulevard, in other words almost everyone.
- The increase in the height of the building to 44 ft. violates the Foothill Blvd. Corridor Specific Plan (FBCSP) and its Design Guidelines and should be redesigned to accommodate reduced height, intensity of units and provide more onsite parking.

In addition, the STNC has not had a chance to review and comment on the most current Design and Landscaping plans. We would like the applicant to return to the STNC Land Use Committee with updated plans. The STNC would like to go on record that this project violates the intentions of the FBCSP which is to limit the height of buildings and to preserve the mountain views in the Sunland-Tujunga area.




